The George Templeton series includes personal correspondence from 1932 to 1995 between him and family members, friends, and his wife; records related to his work at the Templeton Savings and Loan Bank from 1946 until his retirement in 1990; correspondence, notes and other records from 1946 to 1996 related to his involvement in the Whig Party, the Rotary Club, and the North Island Community Services Center; correspondence between him and antiquarian booksellers from 1982 to 1996 documenting his collecting of rare books and autograph manuscripts on the history of Brookville; and one box of plaques and awards that he received throughout his life from local civic and cultural organizations. The Sylvia Grist Templeton series includes personal correspondence from 1936 to 2015 between her and family and friends; and correspondence and other records from 1958 to 2015 related to her philanthropic activities at the Brookville Museum of Contemporary Art. The Thomas Templeton series includes five notebook diaries that he kept while traveling and living in South America in 1902-1906; they document his travels through Brazil, Paraguay, Argentina and Chile and relate his adventures during the Tierra del Fuego Gold rush while he lived near Punta Arenas, Chile from 1903-1906.

He attended public schools in Brookville, took a BA degree from Algonquin State University, and served in the U.S. Army as a second lieutenant in Western Europe during World War II. In 1946, Templeton joined his father, Thomas Templeton, at the Templeton Savings and Loan Bank, which the family started in 1912. Templeton met and married Sylvia Grist in 1950. Templeton was active in Brookville and North Island political life throughout the 1950s-1980s. He was a prominent member of the local Whig Party, although he never ran for public office. Templeton was also active in the Rotary Club and the North Island Community Services Center, where he served as board president from 1987 to 1992. Towards the end of his live, Templeton became an avid book and manuscript collector, amassing a collection of original manuscript letters and rare books on the history of Brookville. Templeton died in 1997. Sylvia Grist Templeton, a member of the Grist family that settled the North Island area in the 1690s, was born at the family estate of Elm Ridge on January 31, 1928. Grist Templeton attended private schools in New England and returned to Brookville in 1949. She and George Templeton were married in 1950. Grist Templeton took a special interest in the Brookville Museum of Contemporary Art, which she financially supported throughout its infancy and growth. She continues to be active on the Museum's Board of Trustees. Thomas Templeton (1883-1947), father of George Templeton, was a prominent banker and civic leader in Brookville. He and his brother, Horace Templeton (1875-1951), founded the Templeton Savings and Loan Bank in 1912. From 1902-1906 Templeton traveled throughout South America and took part in the Tierra del Fuego Gold Rush, which reached fever pitch during his two-year stay near Punta Arenas, Chile from 1903-1906.

In order to complete this exercise, I began with a DACS template, and with the aid of the DACS to EAD to MARC Crosswalk, I plugged in all the information from the XML file. I then used that as the source of most of the information in the MARC record, using the DACS MARC Cataloging Template. I did this because, despite the color differentiation, I found all the encoded text too busy to easily browse through. I also consulted the LOC website on creating MARC records to double check I was using the correct indicators, subfield codes, and punctuation.
